REGULATIONS CHANGES - Now that the Anderson Township Historical Society has celebrated its 10th anniversary, the Board of Trustees recommend that this would be an appropriate time to propose for your approval, amendments to the Code of Regulations.

Our accomplishments have been outstanding and our scope of activities so broad, the Board of Trustees feel the proposed changes are necessary in carrying out our goals in the future.

Please read the articles of the Code of Regulations and the recommended changes described below. A special meeting will be called preceding the regular meeting on June 7, 1978, when the general membership will be asked to vote on the proposed changes.

ARTICLE VI, part (b) present

The Board of Trustees shall be composed of the officers of the Corporation, the Chairmen of the standing committees and five trustees elected from the general membership.

PROPOSED CHANGE -

The Board of Trustees shall be composed of the officers of the Corporation, the Chairmen of the standing committees, six trustees elected from the general membership, a Coordinator and the immediate Past President.

ARTICLE XIII Standing Committees present

(a) The chairmen of the standing committees shall be appointed by the President with the advise and consent of the elected trustees.

(b) The standing committees shall be: (1) Finance Committee, (2) Research Committee, (3) Project Committee, (4) Repository Committee.

PROPOSED CHANGE -

Standing Committees, Coordinator and immediate Past President.

(a) The Chairmen of the standing committees and the Coordinator shall be appointed by the President with the advise and consent of the elected trustees. Each standing committee chairman will select at least two, but not more than four other members to serve on that committee.

(b) The standing committees and their duties shall be:

(1) Finance committee; shall be responsible for the financial affairs of the Corporation, including setting up a budget, annual audit of the Treasurer's records, and methods and resources for raising revenue.

(2) Research committee; shall be responsible for collecting information pertaining to the Anderson Township area, including the recording, printing or publication of articles, pamphlets, and books.

(3) Project committee; shall be responsible for the organization and direction of special endeavors of the Corporation, including tours, field trips, educational activities, and participation in community affairs.

(4) Repository committee; shall be responsible acquisition-custodian of permanent possessions of the Corporation, including historic materials, artifacts and furnishings.

(5) Log House and all Real Properties committee; shall be responsible for the care and maintenance of real properties owned, including plans for restoration and expansion as well as plans for acquisition of additional real properties.

(c) The Coordinator shall act as an advisor to all officers, trustees and committee chairmen to help provide continuity and smooth operations of activities of the Corporation.

(d) The immediate Past President shall remain on the Board in an advisory capacity.
