NEWS:

The Anderson Township Historical Society maintains a membership in the American Association of State and Local History (AASLH), which many of our members were not aware of. This membership has, since the inception of the ATHS, been extremely useful in developing our system of identification and keeping track of all our possessions. The AASLH also provides many articles and technical booklets that are valuable to householders, collectors, and historians. Some examples of these are:

The AASLH publishes a monthly magazine, History News, which also provides us with many relevant articles. The collection of the technical booklets and the issues of History News are kept at the office of the ATHS, in the Brick House. They are all available for your examination. NEWS CONTINUED

The Anderson Branch of the Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County is hosting a special program during the month of May,

"QUEENSGATE II: ARCHAEOLOGY IN DOWNTOWN CINCINNATI"

The Queensgate II project was a study of the lifestyles of Cincinnatians who lived in one of Cincinnati's oldest sections, just northwest of City Hall. Three former home sites were studied by the Miami Purchase Assn. The properties excavated represent homes of a typical working class family, as well as the home of an upper economic class family. Privies, cisterns and builders trenches were excavated, since these were often used as a means to dispose of trash. Objects unearthed were washed and catalogued. Bottles turned out to be the biggest find. Many samples of former local breweries were found, as well as patent medicine bottles. Many other items were also discovered, including ceramic items, combs, hairbrushes, etc. One of the more interesting finds involved the uniform and pistol of a former police officer who resided here in 1899.

A special slide program on the dig will be presented May 26th, 7:30PM, at the Anderson Branch Library. For any additional information, contact the branch at 369-6959.

 - 4) Work with material to make the arrangements.
 - 5) Work in the Annex during arrangement time to keep items organized.
