DULCIMER SOCIETY "SWEET MUSIC" WILL ENHANCE COUNTRY STORE FESTIVITIES IN SEPTEMBER

The sweet sounds of dulcimer music will again grace the Country Store activities on both Saturday and Sunday, September 19 and 20. The Cincinnati Dulcimer Society members, who give numerous performances throughout the city and surrounding counties, have agreed to appear as part of the ATHS Country Store again this fall. This years concert will be enhanced by the addition of amplification, so more of our members and guests will be able to hear this delightful music. George Scheper will also perform on his hammer dulcimer on the weekend.

The mountain (or lap) dulcimer is native to the Appalachian Mountains and a unique invention of American musicians. The hammer dulcimer originated in the Middle East and is the forerunner of the piano.

NEW HARMONY, INDIANA FEATURED IN OCTOBER TRIP

A very interesting and enjoyable trip to New Harmony is planned for October 12-14. The town was founded in 1804 as a religious community and later was taken over by a "Utopian" communal group, both of whom left the town a rich heritage.

A two-night stay at the charming New Harmony Inn, noted for its attractive period furnishings and fine food, is scheduled. The trip includes tours to all the sites of interest in New Harmony and an all-day sight-seeing tour with a private guide to Vincennes, site of the George Rogers Clark National Park Memorial, and "Grouseland", the 1806 home of William Henry Harrison during his term as Territorial Governor.

Departure from the Presbyterian Church parking lot is Monday, October 12, at 8 A.M. Return is Wednesday, October 14, at 8 P.M. The bus is comfortable, air conditioned, and has "facilities". This five-hour drive will have a lunch stop on Monday and a dinner stop, Wednesday, on the way home.

Total cost is \$145 for double occupancy (\$30 additional for single). This includes transportation, guide and entrance fees, two nights at New Harmony Inn, dinner Monday and Tuesday, continental breakfast Tuesday and Wednesday and lunch on Tuesday at Vincennes.

ANDERSON STATE ROAD TO BE COMMEMORATED BY OHIO

ATHS agreed to endorse the commemoration of the Anderson State Road, first authorized by appropriation of funds by the Legislature of the State of Ohio in 1804. This road connected the new capital Chillicothe with Cincinnati and crossed through Anderson Township.
