Dr. David T. Clark, Dept. of Anthropology, Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C. will present a program on his recent dig of Waihe'e Village in Maui, on August 3, at Mt. Washington Presbyterian Church at 7:30 p.m.

However, before the meeting, at 6:00 p.m., Dr. Clark and his friend Ivy Caldito (a native Hawaiian) with the assistance of Ruth Clark (his mother) and other ATHS members will prepare an authentic Hawaiian luau (buffet) for any members and their guests who care to participate.

The menu will consist of Kalua Pig (baked pork), a baked chicken dish prepared with cellophane spaghetti and Lomi Lomi Salmon. Hawaiian punch and wonton appetizer will be featured, as well as vegetable stir fry, Hawaiian noodles and fresh fruit. This tremendous feast, including tableware and simple decorations will be offered at cost -- \$6.50.
