COUNTY ENGINEERS ASSIST IN CREEK CONTROL

The Hamilton County Engineer, William Brayshaw, recently lent a helping hand to the Anderson Township Historical Society at the Miller-Leuser Farm, located on Cough Pike near Bartels Road.

While performing routine maintenance work on the culvert approach near Clough, engineer maintenance forces deepened and straightened the channel which had started to erode the foundation of the historical barn. The Newtown Maintenance Supervisor, Bill Hill, assisted by Foreman Larry Young and his expert backhoe operator, Chuck Kaylor, made short work of this problem, diverting the flow of the branch away from the barn. Mr. Brayshaw's Operation manager, Dick DeLozier, coordinated the operation with the Society's Trustee Al Wettstein.

Turpin High School students from Mr. Dan Dever's American History classes will now complete the work of hand-placing protective stone gathered from the stream bed against the barn's foundation. This work will be supervised by Anderson Township volunteers Ed Yorgen, Bill Browne and Pat Carigan.
