1976 SPRING TOUR

Saturday, May 22nd, we will embark on our annual Spring Tour.
destination - Maysville and Washington, Kentucky and Ripley, Ohio.

We depart promptly at 8:30 AM, heading east along the scenic Ohio River. The Ohio and Kentucky hills will be alive with spring color. At 10 AM we arrive in Maysville, a town rich in history, which is built against the hills rising steeply above the river. A tour of the Mason County Museum will be first on the agenda. The museum building was built as a library in 1876 and has now been restored and listed in the National Register of Historic Places. It now houses a historical museum which tells the full story of the pioneers settling in the area. It has artifacts, photographs, excitingly detailed river dioramas and much more.

After touring the museum, we will have a guided tour, by bus, of the town. Many houses in Maysville are very old and are of a wide variety of architectural types, and most have spectacular views of the river.

Now, comes a highlight of the tour. We travel to Washington, Kentucky, and have lunch at George's Restaurant, owned by Ruth Clark who is a member of A.T.H.S. You can look forward to a delicious lunch, including Ruth's homemade breads and pastries. The restaurant occupies a house built in 1800. The building has been restored and is furnished with antiques and other items which can be purchased. After lunch, there will be time to stroll through the town, visit shops, or relax at George's.

The next stop is Ripley, Ohio to visit the Rankin House. This beautiful building is situated on a high hill with a beautiful view of the Ohio River. The house was a headquarters for escaping slaves during the early 1800's. After going through the house, we'll have refreshments on the broad expanse of lawn and enjoy the view. Reboarding, we return to Cincinnati by 5:15 PM.
