
A.T.H.S. BI-CENTENNIAL MINUTE

ANDERSON TOWNSHIP HISTORICAL SOCIETY
1977 SPRING MOTORCOACH TOUR

DATE: Saturday, June 11, 1977

DEPART: 7:30 AM - Mt. Washington Presbyterian Church
(Please park at rear of parking lot)

HISTORICAL and ARCHITECTURAL ATTRACTIONS:

1. Chillicothe, Ohio - founded in 1796, the first state capital, 1803-10 and 1812-16.

Ross County Historical Society Museum features exhibits of pioneer crafts, firearms, furniture, toys, costumes, an Indian room and Ohio's Constitution Table.

Adena State Memorial is a stone mansion of Georgian architecture, built in 1806-07 by Thomas Worthington, early settler and Governor, and designed by Benjamin Latrobe, who directed construction of the Nation's Capitol. The grounds on the east side of the house are patterned after the original garden, and an overlook is said to have inspired the Great Seal of Ohio.

2. Circleville

Pickaway County Historical Society Museum is housed in The Clarke-May House which was built in sections from the 1840's through the early '50's, bequeathed to the Society in 1966 and dedicated on June 18, 1972.

3. Columbus

The Ohio Historical Center is a showcase which captures the essence of the Buckeye State's proud past.

Ohio Village is a fourteen building reconstructed community of 19th century craftspeople.

The full day itinerary includes continental breakfast, sandwich, etc. for lunch, and dinner at Ohio's Second Oldest Operating Coach Stop, built in 1837, visited by six presidents, and is a Registered Historical Landmark on Old National Road U.S. Rt. 40.

Plans are made for an interesting and most memorable (yet not too exhausting) day for us to truly experience OHIO HISTORY with good friends in a pleasant atmosphere.
